



In its 35th year, the 2025 festival will be bolder, brighter, and more beautiful than ever before. 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





Te Kāhui Auaha by Madelaine Empson



Just as I sat down to write yet another column about Taylor Swift (how cool is she though), I got the news that Te Kāhui Auaha is facing potential closure. Te Auaha is Wellington's only creative polytech and a premier venue for the arts, with two theatres, a bar, rehearsal studios, a cinema, and a gallery.

Losing it would be a devastating blow, as many industry leaders have reflected on in articles by The Post and RNZ. Searching 'Te Auaha' on my work computer returned more than 300 articles and listings we've written about the shows, events, and exhibitions that have taken place there in the seven years it's been running so far. Throwing my hat in the ring as the editor of Regional News and a theatre reviewer, I'd like to reflect on

my top five shows and moments at Te Auaha. Being

moved to tears by Trick of the Light's portrayal of grief in *The Griegol*, seeing the space transformed by Indian Ink's Mrs Krishnan's Party, feeling pins and needles during WITCH Music Theatre's Sweeney Todd, singing along to The Addams Family, A New Musical with the exceptional cast of Te Auaha Musical Theatre students, and cracking up at one of my favourite Kiwi comedians, Guy Montgomery, with a very special friend of mine. I myself have actually performed at Te Auaha. Last year on a complete whim, I decided to compete in a spoken word poetry event at The Fringe Bar, despite not having dabbled in the artform for over a

decade. Most people just get drunk after a breakup, but okay. I rather nervously performed a poem I'd written called Very Important Donut and from there was invited to compete in *The Anti-Slam: Worst* Poet Wins at Te Auaha. Tasked with writing literally the worst poem my brain could buy, I created this super weird monologue piece that riffed off a niche Friends reference. Sadly, my poem actually scored very highly, thanks in large part to a judge dressed as Christopher Luxon giving me 10 out of 10 because he "really likes Friends". Scoring highly means your poem is good, and to be clear, that is bad. I lost the competition spectacularly. Aces! Speak to any Poneke creative and they'll have come through Te Auaha's doors in one way or another. I hope this vital institution can keep those doors open. Advice from Alan The Privacy Commissioner



information about them is being collected, how it is stored and used, to access the information held, and to request correction if it is wrong. If you believe your privacy has been breached, you should first try to resolve matters with the organisation concerned. Wait at least 30 days for a response before you complain to the Privacy Commissioner. They are unlikely to investigate matters more than 12 months old and you must have suffered some harm from the breach before they will look into it. They are also unlikely to

to prevent a repeat, or provided compensation. The Privacy Commissioner cannot force anyone to pay damages or a fine or even to accept their findings, but it is unusual for an organisation to ignore the findings. An organisation has 20 working days to respond to a request for access to or correction of information. Some extensions are possible in limited circumstances, but the organisation must explain why it needs an extension and when they will provide the information. Access to information can only be refused in specific situations. During an investigation, the Privacy Commissioner will look at opportunities to resolve issues in a way acceptable to both parties. They will look at which principles of the Privacy Act may have been breached and seek relevant information before reaching a view on whether there has been an interference with privacy. A conciliation conference might be arranged to attempt a resolution. If a complaint is not settled, the Privacy

Commissioner will provide their view on whether

there has been a breach and a certificate that the

matter has been investigated by them. A claim to

Nature's home





Only minutes from the centre of Wellington, a lush native forest sits waiting for you to explore. Zealandia Te Māra a Tāne is a 225-hectare ecosanctuary located in a hidden valley surrounded by the world's first predator exclusion fence. This special fence keeps mammalian predators out, providing rare and threatened native species with a safe place to call home.

The fence has allowed this groundbreaking conservation project to exist for over 25 years. Some initiatives have included reintroducing native wildlife and plants back into the area, some of which were previously absent from mainland New Zealand for over 100 years. As their numbers increase in the sanctuary, the manu/birds fly beyond the fence and into the city. Years of community trapping and habitat restoration now means they can call Wellingtonians' backyards home, creating one of the only cities in the world where native bird biodiversity is increasing.

Only two kilometres from downtown Wellington, the award-winning sanctuary provides the opportunity to get up close with these rare and endangered species living in the wild. The 8.6-kilometre fence surrounding the sanctuary creates a feeling of stepping back in time as you enter through the gates. But how did a sanctuary happen to form in the heart of our capital city?

The valley of the sanctuary has a rich history, making it possible for this project to fall into

place in a time when it feels like nature is often disregarded. The arrival of European settlers saw the burning of much of the original forest and the valley turned into farmland. In the early 1870s, part of this farmland was taken over to construct a water reservoir for Wellington City. In 1978, engineers found the dam to be an earthquake risk, the lake behind the dam was lowered, and in 1991 the upper dam was decommissioned. After this, sanctuary founder Jim Lynch began writing a proposal for the project.


It all started with a simple word: imagine. "Imagine a secret valley in the heart of Wellington with a world-first fence providing sanctuary for precious

native species" is how the pitch for the sanctuary began. The community rallied around that word, and "imagine" soon became a 500-year plan of regeneration. The proposal was backed, a charity created, and a world-first fence was designed, prototyped, and completed in 1999. This valley has only been regenerating for 25 years, but we are already seeing that when you make a space for nature, that nature will return.



You can explore the goldfields in the bottom of South Island,

the first European buildings at the top of the North Island, Māori settlements and sacred sites, historic towns and city centres, forts and bases constructed during WWII, and so much more. There are over 6000 heritage locations to visit and hundreds of museums recounting everything we know about the past.

And that's not all: Aotearoa New Zealand has been around a lot longer than its people, so make sure to explore our natural environment too. From nature

We worked up an oar and a blanket as a sail, sailing under these massive Soviet-style bridges at night with a flotilla of small boats - some with smoke machines and all sorts. Just absolute magic. It was like a dream.



Cat scampers and hunts in the tangled undergrowth of a forest, his home a dwelling abandoned by humans, who are absent throughout this animated dreamscape from visionary Latvian filmmaker Gints Zilbalodis despite their influence being acutely felt. When a flood of biblical proportions submerges the world, Cat must adapt. Cat jumps onboard a passing sailboat, joining a ragtag crew of creatures comprising a capybara, ring-tailed lemur, golden retriever, and secretary bird. Together, they embark on a picaresque adventure through paintbrush landscapes (created by designer Zilbalodis and animation director Léo Silly Pélissier), each episode more charmingly heart-wrenching than the last. Zilbalodis, Matīss Kaža, and Ron Dyens' script is devoid of dialogue yet not of expression. The characters are not anthropomorphic in the slightest, their movements hyper-realistic and their sounds recorded from real life creatures, and yet they are sprinkled with a touch of magical realism that administers us with enough suspended disbelief to become utterly entranced in the story. Each character has its typical animalistic quirk – I picture Cat who knocks Lemur's trinket off the shelf just because – yet they possess enough humanness to make them emotionally capable of exploring relatable themes of loss, bonding, and camaraderie. Flow is a tale about a wary creature learning to trust and depend on others as it learns about the intrinsic interconnected nature of the world. In this way, Zilbalodis' cinematography places us directly into the action from Cat's point of view, his editing fast-paced to build tension but allowing breathing room in between to give way to more gentle moments. Combined, they give Flow a gamelike lens, teaching the audience through visual details. Meanwhile, Zilbalodis and Rihards Zalupe's score carries us through moments of peril and playfulness with music tailored perfectly to the ebb and flow of the narrative.
